GlobalWA is the only organization in the Pacific Northwest that unites non-profits, businesses, foundations and academic institutions working in global development.

We shine a spotlight on our members, their work and their impact worldwide. In turn, we have played a central role in establishing Washington state as a hub for this sector. By convening stakeholders in the global development community,

HIGHLIGHTS

Microsoft Giving Campaign

GlobalWA worked with leaders of the Microsoft Giving Campaign to promote our non-profit members and a variety of issues and



geographies as an option for employee giving. We also presented Microsoft employees with volunteer opportunities at GlobalWA organizations, which was featured in Microsoft's internal newsletter at the launch of their campaign. GlobalWA assisted non-profit members in registering for Microsoft's campaign by sharing resources and facilitating a dialogue around fundraising best practices.

To build on our goal of increasing employee giving to GlobalWA members, we intend to replicate this model with other companies.

Engaging elected officials and thought leaders

Conversations and the exchange of ideas and perspectives with elected representatives and prominent development leaders are invaluable for increasing the political clout and standing of GlobalWA members. In 2015, GlobalWA members met with President of Tanzania, Jakaya Kikwete, Washington Rep. Adam Smith and Michelle Nunn, CEO of CARE.

Connect

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Presentations to prompt action

Informational presentations and access to corporate workplaces, prospective donors, supporters and volunteers are valuable opportunities to prompt action and engagement.

In 2015, GlobalWA coordinated a tour of PATH and volunteer opportunities at Medical Teams International.

In addition, we coordinated a presentation with Theo Chocolate to 150 Zillow employees. The discussion focused on fair trade, working in conflict zones and conditions confronting farmers.

GLOBALWA WAS THE CONDUIT FOR 92 NEW CONNECTIONS MADE VIA INTRODUCTIONS AND REFERRALS. SEVERAL CONNECTIONS LED TO CONCRETE RESULTS INCLUDING NEW BOARD MEMBERS, FUNDERS AND MOUS.

GlobalWA also curates a Speakers Bureau to facilitate presentations to employees about current global issues.

The 2015 Global Washington Conference

Seattle and Washington state are home to a vibrant high-tech and innovation-minded business and development community. GlobalWA showcased the region's exceptional standing in new technology, innovative problem-solving and transformational approaches — and how our members are realizing this potential to improve lives — at the 2015 conference.

Convening over 400 practitioners in global development, the seventh annual conference brought together subject matter experts, recognized academics and leaders in the nonprofit and private sector. Panel discussions and a series of break-out sessions explored cuttingedge approaches to effective programming and leadership, the nuances of best practices and social entrepreneurship, as well as an assessment of how we measure success and truly move the needle forward on the global development agenda.



A line-up of dynamic, insightful keynote speakers delved into the many different ways we can apply novel and non-traditional ideas toward solving pressing global challenges and go beyond the bells and whistles and shiny objects of new technology. Innovation, an issue of critical importance in global development was at the heart of many discussions, and, as in previous years, the conference remains of highest value to our members.

Promote

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A STEADY DRUM BEAT OF ENGAGEMENT AND VISIBILITY

Throughout the year, GlobalWA members mobilized to respond to long-simmering issues or newly emerging crises across the globe. And GlobalWA kept in step through bold initiatives to better promote our members and to raise awareness of their work.

In 2015, we took promotional strategies in promising new directions. By developing an enhanced communications framework, we increased audience engagement across all platforms. We maintained a consistent spotlight on our members and their accomplishments on social media channels, in blogs and in enewsletters. We expanded community outreach and strengthened our media outreach.

2015 Monthly Issue Campaigns

GlobalWA recognizes the complexity of challenges worldwide that our members here in Washington state tackle each day. To foster a broader dialogue and greater visibility of member initiatives, we curated a select series focused on key issues that are central to their programs and the geographical regions where they work.

GlobalWA then highlighted these issues throughout digital and social media channels, and through a rich calendar of events such as roundtables and panel discussions.

KEY ISSUES ADDRESSED BY OUR MEMBERS

Solutions for food insecurity

Today, there are approximately 795 million people who are undernourished, a crisis that demands reform in the global food and agricultural system to nourish the world's hungry.

Landesa is a GlobalWA member working on the front lines of the fight for food security. They are a global leader in land right reforms and are working to improve smallholder farmers' livelihoods.

The Washington-India connection

India has enjoyed consistently high rates of growth and steady improvement in human development. Despite this progress, persistent poverty and inequality remain.

A number of Washington state organizations, including GlobalWA members Upaya Social Ventures and Unitus Seed Fund, play a significant role in assisting India in its efforts to achieve development targets for poverty reduction, education and health.

Realizing universal education

Everyone has a right to education. Between 2000 and 2010, the number of out-of-school primary aged children dropped by almost 37 million, but for 57 million more children, primary school remains beyond reach.

GlobalWA member Sahar works with Afghan communities to support an educated future for Afghan girls by building schools, computer centers and implementing teacher training programs.

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HIGHLIGHTS

Syria: Conflict, displacement and women

After five years of conflict, Syria's civil war rages on and with no end in sight. It has claimed more than 470,000 lives and displaced more than 11 million people. The country's infrastructure and institutions have been utterly destroyed and the resulting migrant crisis has spilled across the Middle East and Europe.

GlobalWA partnered with The Seattle Foundation, Washington Women's Foundation and Global Fund for Women to host a wellattended lunch panel discussion, "Beyond the headlines: The Syrian refugee crisis and its impact on women and girls."

Coffee: Growing a sustainable economy

The explosive growth of the coffee industry for which our region is legend — has revealed an opportunity to create sustainable economic growth through innovative programs in coffeegrowing communities worldwide.

For the industry to evolve in a socially responsible manner, business models must support the triple bottom line: profits, people and planet.

Building on conversations and connections forged at the Specialty Coffee Association Expo in Seattle, GlobalWA held an invitation-only reception called "Equity in a cup."

KEY ISSUES ADDRESSED BY OUR MEMBERS

The fight to end malaria

Malaria is an infectious disease that threatens the lives of 3.3 billion people around the world and claims approximately 600,000 lives a year.

Among them, 78 percent are children under 5 years of age. Malaria No More is a GlobalWA member leading the race to eliminate the disease.

They engage political and community leaders, rally the public through awareness campaigns and deliver lifesaving tools to families across Africa.



Cultivating global ambassadors

As the world becomes ever more interconnected, a global education and mindset are fundamental to dismantle stereotypes and foster collaboration among people from different backgrounds and cultures.

GlobalWA member Global Visionaries is empowering youth to become active leaders and global citizens.

Their cornerstone program is a school-yearlong curriculum for high school students that culminates with an immersion experience in Guatemala.

Promote

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Nepal earthquake recovery



In April 2015, a devastating 7.8 earthquake struck Nepal, claiming more than 8,000 lives and destroying villages across numerous districts.

MORE THAN 1 MILLION PEOPLE WERE IN NEED OF FOOD ASSISTANCE AND 2.8 MILLION WERE DISPLACED.

In partnership with The Seattle Foundation, GlobalWA facilitated a discussion at the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation for the Seattle donor community about current, first-hand knowledge of the earthquake response. This effort helped to raise \$96,500 for earthquake relief and recovery.

RESOURCES TO SET A COURSE FOR GREATER GOOD

GlobalWA is a valued capacity-building resource to Washington's global development community. Events and workshops are excellent opportunities to exchange ideas and insights and to gain access to a broad scope of expertise.

Last year, we made significant strides in improving member services, with clear feedback that the mix of VIP events, topic-specific events and skill-building roundtables effectively serve the varying needs of our member organizations, both large and small.

Executive Director Roundtables

GlobalWA has proactively supported the leaders of our member organizations through roundtable discussions, with an emphasis on peer-to-peer learning.

Roundtables have addressed emerging leadership trends and new organizational structure models and management topics.

GlobalWA is a go-to member resource for support and provides referrals for technical assistance, global trends, volunteers, board members and best practices. For our member organizations, we also provide employees and board members with an orientation to the global development community in our region.

GlobalWA.org offers a community calendar for member organizations to post their upcoming events such as fundraisers, workshops and speaker presentations. Our online career center is a valuable employment hub to post job and board openings, as well as volunteer and internship opportunities, and our interactive map offers a dynamic representation of our membership and their scope of work.



GIVEBIG FUNDRAISING CAMPAIGN

The 2015 GiveBIG fundraising campaign was a huge success for our members in part due to a boost they received through a GlobalWA / Seattle International Foundation partnership.

The 48 GlobalWA member organizations that participated raised a collective \$855,000. Of those, the 43 organizations that met their match were awarded an additional \$177,500.


